

Peter Conti, professor of astro-physics at the University of Colorado in Boulder, was awarded an honorary doctoral degree by the University of Utrecht, Holland, March 26. Whatever happened to C.K. Adkar...or Ed Artnak...or Marcelino Barquin...or Carlos Botero...or Pierre Haussoullier?

Here's an extract from last June's issue of Global Finance:

"They said it couldn't be done. When Argentine President Carlos Menem chose José "Pepe" Estenssoro in August 1990 to whip the bloated state oil company, Yacimientos Petroliferos Fiscales, into shape, it looked like the Latin American equivalent of Mission: Impossible.

"YPF had been losing half a billion dollars a year on sales of \$4.5 billion. Some oil industry executives suspect that actual losses might have been closer to \$2 billion a year; management was so chaotic, says one, 'they never knew what they were spending.'

"Now, less then three years later, Estenssoro appears to have pulled off one of the world's great corporate house-cleanings. For the past month he has been the star of a road show to world financial capitals as a slimmed-down, profitable YPF prepares to float shares on the global market. In what promises to be 1993's biggest privatization, Argentina is selling 35 percent of a company that earned \$171 million on \$4 billion in sales last year—and even in its downsized form is worth some \$6.5-8 billion.

"An avid golfer and trout fisherman, Estenssoro is a 27-year veteran of Hughes Tool's drilling equipment operation in Argentina, which he headed from 1987 to 1989 before trying his hand running a small Argentine oil exploration company, Sol Petróleo, for a couple of years. His first hurdle in the YPF post was to face down politically powerful unions and provincial government interests on the old YPF board that were accustomed to political accommodation and featherbedding in state companies.

"Estenssoro sold off non-core assets and scuttled YPF's oil monopoly, thus opening the country to concessions for private oil companies, foreign as well as Argentine. YPF now will account for about 50 percent of Argentina's refining capacity and 60 percent of the market for fuel products. He also whacked the payroll from 51,000 to 9,000. By the end of this year it should be down to 8,000.

"Estenssoro has achieved much in an astonishingly short time. To the admiration of the world's investors, Pepe has played through an obstacle-laden course—and beaten par by a wide margin." Te recuerda tu amigo, Hoel.

Hapeman Establishes Steinmetz Scholarship

Rensselaer has received a \$10,000 grant to establish an endowment fund for students enrolled in engineering or science from Martin Hapeman '58, winner of the 1993 Charles P. Steinmetz Award. The Martin Hapeman '58 Steinmetz Scholarship will be offered for the first time to a freshman this fall.

The Steinmetz Award is the most prestigious award given for technical achievement by the General Electric Co. to its employees. The winner receives a medal, GE stock, and a \$10,000 grant from the GE Foundation for the school or college of his or her choice.






